USING NURSE MIDWIVES



WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

Your health plan covers care from a nurse midwife. This information may help you decide if using a nurse midwife is a good option for you.

WHAT IS A NURSE MIDWIFE?

A nurse midwife is a registered nurse who graduated from an accredited nurse-midwifery program. A nurse midwife also passed a national exam. A nurse midwife helps you during pregnancy, labor, delivery, and after the birth. Nurse midwives deliver babies at birthing centers or at home. Most can also deliver babies at a hospital.

Nurse midwives can also:

- Educate you about pregnancy, birth, newborn care and breastfeeding
- Provide prenatal care and postpartum care
- · Help you to make a birth plan
- Advise you about diet and exercise
- · Refer you to an obstetrician if necessary

WHY CHOOSE A NURSE MIDWIFE?

Women without problems during pregnancy may choose a nurse midwife for:

- Decreased incidence of an episiotomy, fetal monitoring or induced labor
- · A natural childbirth without use of medications
- Emotional, social and practical support
- · Delivery outside of a hospital setting
